## What is a "Subject"?

The nouns that "do" the verb.


First consider this simple sentence: "Superhero Guy is standing." Nouns can be subjects or objects, but verbs can not. "Superhero Guy" is the only noun. Is it a subject? Yes. How do we know? We look at the verb. What is it? "Standing." Now we ask "who or what is standing?" The answer: "Superhero Guy." This means that "Superhero Guy" is the subject. He's the one actually doing the verb.

## What is an "Object"?

*The nouns that "get/receive" the verb.* 

Now consider this sentence: "Superhero Guy is carrying a car on his head." What's the verb? "Carrying." "Who or what is carrying?" "Superhero Guy" (so again, SG is the subject). Who or what is Superhero Guy carrying? "The car." Therefore, the car is the object. It is the thing that is "getting/receiving" the verb - it is being carried.\*

## Subject vs. Object: Quick and Dirty



<sup>\*</sup>The answer to why Superhero Guy is carrying a car on his head is a much more complicated question, which we'll save for another day.
